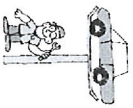

Save money as part of sales tax holiday

Area residents can take advantage of a state sales tax holiday from April 25-27 and save hundreds of dollars on school supplies, computers and clothing. During the sales tax holiday, retailers statewide can't charge sales taxes for designated goods. Eligible purchases include clothing and school supplies priced \$100 or less for each item. Computers are also exempt from sales taxes. The measure applies only to retail sales to private individuals and excludes suppliers for businesses.

"We are pleased to be able to give back to the taxpayer," said State Rep. Jim Hackett, whose office issued a press release on the subject that explained what items are eligible. "Our sales tax holiday program will give working families an opportunity to save real money this spring on a wide variety of items."

In addition to cash and credit card purchases, shoppers can use discount coupons or loyalty cards for eligible items without paying sales tax. Exchanges of merchandise are also allowed, but the original item must be re-purchased for the same item in another size or color. Qualified goods may also be placed on or picked up from lay-away tax-free during the month. Rain checks, mail orders, and Internet and telephone orders are tax-exempt, provided the consumer orders and pays for the merchandise during the sales tax holiday period.



OR Montessori to hold fundraiser

On April 26, 2008, the Montessori School of Oak Ridge (MSOR) is holding a fundraiser to be held by the state of Tennessee for operation as a parent-owned cooperative.

The event will be held in the gym at 728 Emory Valley Road from 7 a.m. until 2 p.m., rain or shine. Twenty-five families are participating in the sale. There are over 220 exciting items to bid on-for example, Disney World day passes, Dollywood passes, furniture, gift certificates to local area restaurants and hotels, and an over-sight say for a condo in Pigeon Forge.

The value of each item will be posted and a minimum bid will be provided on a sign-up sheet. Bids will be accepted until 2 p.m. The highest bidder will be notified. If the winning bidder is not able to register to pick up their item, they will be contacted on the following Monday.

All proceeds from the auction will benefit the MSOR and the students. In addition, 25% of the money raised will be used to fund a scholarship for a student that does not have the means attend the MSOR. The MSOR is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization. MSOR is certified by the Tennessee Department of Education for kindergarten and general education and complies with all state safety and child care regulations. There are presently 20 students attending the school and new students are welcome.

The MSOR began in 1977 and is dedicated to providing a high-quality Montessori program to children 2 and a half to 6 years from all racial, ethnic, religious and cultural backgrounds. The program is designed to foster self-directed behavior and respect for others. The MSOR provides a well-prepared environment in which each child's unique nature is honored and respected.

The "Montessori Method" was created by Maria Montessori in the early 1900's.

She graduated as Italy's first female physician in 1893 from the University of Pavia, where she was a woman ahead of her time.

The basic principle upon which Montessori's method operates is that children are complete beings unto themselves. They are not just adults waiting to happen, but rather, are created as whole beings with innate intelligence worthy of respect.
